Wednesday, Fancy Dress Parade - No vehicles parked in The Avenue, Mid Row, Market Place and West High Street (except in lay-bys off A68).

Thursday, Preliminary Ride - No vehicles parked in The Avenue until after horses depart at 6.15 p.m.

Saturday - No vehicles parked in Mid Row, Market Place, West High Street, The Loan, The Row, Lower Back Road and Mill Wynd. All these areas will be marked with cones. At the Waterin' Stane vehicles are requested to park in designated areas under the supervision of Stewards.

In the interests of safety if people could refrain from parking at the Golf Club, Stewards may ask drivers to divert via Threepwood Crossroads to minimise the risk to pedestrians.

Respect must be shown to all riders and pedestrians. Spectators are asked to stand a safe distance from the cavalcade at all times and do not try to cross the path of any horses.

In the event of any problem or emergency please immediately notify the nearest foot steward or mounted Steward.

Please tidy your litter, any litter should be deposited in the nearest bin or taken home.





Nowadays it can take me some time to remember what happened yesterday, but the summer of '73 when I was Lauder Cornet will be forever imprinted in my mind, and especially the first Saturday in August when I was honoured to carry the standard round the marches of the Royal and Ancient Burgh of Lauder. My flag horse was Copper and I vividly remember Common Riding day as being very windy, so much so that head marshall, Dave Waldie, decided the flag should be tied in. Luckily by the time the cavalcade reached the Waterin' Stane the wind had abated slightly and we were able to continue with the flag unfurled.

Being a 19 year-old Cornet with the exuberance of youth meant I made full opportunity of all the socialising opportunities and attended as many other Common Ridings and festivals as I was able to, making numerous friends along the way. Kindredship

is something that has been well documented and much clichéd in this magazine by other anniversary Cornets, but safe to say it is something that has to be experienced to enable you to appreciate how much it really means and how long-lasting it can be.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish Cornet Mirley, Lass Megan Wilson and all their many supporters the very best for Common Riding day and hope the sun shines sae rosy all week.

60 years seems a long time, but I can remember quite clearly being Lauder Cornet in 1963 following Jock Murray ('62) and Bill Brown ('61), Right Hand and Left Hand men.

It always seemed inevitable that I would do it one day, following my brothers Dave ('53) and Jim ('54), both in their 90s, but still look forward to the first Saturday in August.



It is important to keep traditions alive to remember our historic part as a Royal Burgh for many centuries, being granted our common by Scottish Kings for services rendered to the Crown, the most recent Royal Charter being 1502 -1700 acres of common land which is still cared for by Burges systems to benefit the Lauder common good. The right to claim the common has stood the test of time, being proved in High Court in a case against the Town Council, no less!

So, it is important to me to carry on the tradition of checking the boundary and markers each year followed by the mounted cavalcade.

My first memory of Common Riding week was lying in bed in 16 Market Place in 1946, where I was born in 1940, trying to sleep with the sounds of revelry coming across the street from the Black Bull dining room; the first Ex-Cornets dinner after the war, with Lindsev Thomson as Cornet.


I first rode in 1951, with Jimmy Mackison as Cornet - my horse, Jane, coming from Dumfries at £5 for 2 weeks! I joined the Common Riding Committee after leaving School and was well versed in Common Riding matters by such members as lack Scott, Bill Hardie, Bill Brud, Mulvey, Airch Aitchison, Martin Bell, Wull Gillie, and many others. I also attended the other festivals in the Borders and Musselburgh, made friends for life - the comradeship and fellowship cannot be overstated.

Border Festivals are a guid thing and must be continued. I write this note on the eve of Hawick Common Riding as another season starts - long may they continue.



My brothers Jim (1954) and Bill (Diamond Jubilee Cornet, 1963) also

riders in the cavalcade and my photo album confirms my memory of huge crowds out and about in Lauder. Lady Mary Baillie-Hamilton presented me with the burgh flag, my sash of office and bussed mv colours. Mv chosen colours were red, white and blue as it was the late Oueen's Coronation year. Jean Gray

presented me with the wreath and Provost Crombie-Smith officiated. The morning ride was followed by gymkhana and foot races. A very special day.

Carrying the burgh flag remains a great honour and I was proud to support my sons who were Cornets and my daughter who was Cornet's Lass. I continued to ride and support the Common Riding for many years and I was very proud to lead my grandsons round the marches on their ponies and enjoyed my granddaughter doing the same. I retired from riding when Danny my horse retired.

I continue to enjoy celebrating our traditions and history, although less actively now. I also enjoy seeing how Common Riding week continues to develop and 'move with the times'.

I look forward to following this year's Cornet Jake and his Lass Megan and their supporting team and families. I wish them all a wonderful summer and good luck for their special week.

There were compliments aplenty – about our beautiful Royal Burgh, the organisation of the ride and the opportunity it gave people to go across country, especially young folk who are still learning and are more used to the confines of a riding school.

SADDIF CLOTH

On Common Riding morning you'll notice that the Cornet's horse wears a very nice blue saddle cloth with vellow trim, but you may not be aware of the history behind it. Each year the Cornet is given the saddle cloth to be used on the big day, but it wasn't always quite as smart as it is now...

In 1972 Cornet George Threadgall collected the saddle cloth that he was to use and recalls taking it home to his late mother, Peg. "We found to our horror on returning to the house, that the saddlecloth had, the previous year, been unceremoniously stuffed into a bag, without first having been cleaned or folded in any way. It was, quite frankly, a mouldy, smelly and crumpled mess." Peg quickly decided that a replacement would have to be found, declaring that "There is definitely no way any Cornet should be expected to use that."

With time being of the essence, belonged to George's father Army. Armed with guns and ammo, these exploits behind enemy lines. Though

wounded in action, Sid (and his blankets) survived the war, though was unable to escape the inevitable mosquito bites during his time in the jungle and suffered from bouts of malaria for some time following his safe return.

The blanket was covered with some new blue fabric and yellow ribbon, and the new saddle cloth was ready for its first outing. Peg was very happy for it to be used by each successive Cornet, on the condition that it was collected in


person and returned promptly after Common Riding Day so that she could personally ensure it was properly cleaned and stored in readiness for next year's Cornet. More than half a century later, it's still going strong and now in the safekeeping of our Chief Marshall, Ex Cornet lock Threadgall. Come Saturday 5th

August Cornet Mirley will be the 50th Cornet to use it.

Away from Common Riding Day itself you'll notice that the Cornet and Lass, and Right and Left Hand Supporters, all use matching saddle cloths. These have the same blue with yellow trim design, with the Town Hall embroidered on to them as well. These were donated to the Common Riding Committee for our Principals to use by the Exiles Association in 2011 as part of the celebrations to mark the 100th anniversary of the current Common

Peg opted to make a new saddle cloth herself, using an old war blanket. The blanket had Sid, himself Cornet in 1956, and had a long history of its own. Sid had fought in World War Two, serving as a Sergeant Major in a special forces unit in the Bruma campaign. The unit had been landed by glider behind enemy lines, deep within the hostile jungles of Burma, as part of an elite group of Chindits fighting against the Imperial Japanese highly trained troops also carried their own bedding, which provided invaluable protection against the cold as they slept in their makeshift shelters in readiness for the next day's guerilla activity. These Chindits were publicly accredited for their part in the victory in Burma, with the campaign being shortened by their daring



- MARSHALS WILL BE IN CHARGE Marshals will be clearly identified by Arm Bands and be positioned throughout the ride and will follow the direction of the Head Marshal. Foot marshals will be suitably attired and positioned, as required, at gates and crossings again all due respect should be given to their requirements and instructions.
- 2. RESPONSIBILITIES OF HORSE RIDERS It is the responsibility of all riders taking part to maintain good control of their mount throughout the ride. If a rider becomes dismounted at any time it is their responsibility to either remount and re-join the ride or return their horse to the horsebox. It must be noted that while it is the role of foot or mounted marshals to advise and direct riders it is not their duty to control loose horses.
- 3. DISCIPLINE AT GATES AND CROSSINGS A high degree of discipline and courtesy should be shown at all times by all riders at gates and crossings. It may be possible and in some cases preferable to pass through a gate or crossing and muster on the other side (marshals will advise).
- **4. ROUTES** The routes are pre-arranged between the Common Riding Committee, Farmers/Landowners and Police. Therefore all riders are required to adhere to the agreed route. If for any reason a rider has to leave the ride early a marshal must be notified.
- 5. DRESS CODE To maintain our previous high standards, only smart, suitable riding gear will be accepted. This also applies to anyone joining the ride at any point. It should be noted that <u>SUITABLE PROTECTIVE HEADGEAR</u> <u>MUST BE WORN BY ALL RIDERS.</u>
- 6. BASIC MANNERS AND COURTESY Should be shown to all fellow riders, marshals members of the public and the farmers/landowners who support and allow us to cross their land.
- 7. TIMING All riders should be aware that it is essential that we maintain our current high standards of timekeeping for the Police who control and manage the time we spend on public roads, not least the public who enthusiastically wait on their Cornet's arrival (marshals will control).
- WALKERS To the requirements of farmers/ landowners it is essential that all dogs must be kept on a lead at all times.

LAUDER COMMON RIDINGRiders Code of Conduct

- 9. EMERGENCY PROCEDURE In the event of any problem arising, be it damage to gates or fences, breakage of essential tack or injury to horse or rider, immediate contact should be made with either a mounted or foot marshal so that any necessary action be taken (i.e. first aid, veterinary help or help with spare tack). It is the owner's/hirer's responsibility for all costs incurred.
- **10. GENERAL** In an effort to retain some element of respect it should be noted that:
- a. Any rider who is found to be under the influence of alcohol and to be incapable of controlling their mount, will, at the discretion of the Chief Marshal, immediately be excluded from the ride.
- Riders MUST NOT mount the pavement for any reason whatsoever.
- c. Any rider found using foul and abusive language or creating a public nuisance will be severely dealt with and may be asked to leave the ride.
- d. All riders should assist both riding and foot marshals to address these problems.
- e. Any rider who fails to keep up with the riding marshal maybe requested to leave the ride.
- 11. INSURANCE It is the responsibility of those taking part, or their legal guardians in the case of minors, to ensure that the participants have appropriate and adequate insurance cover for personal injury and third party liability cover and they take all reasonable steps to ensure their own safe participation in the events,
- 12. YOUNG RIDERS It should be noted by all concerned that young or inexperienced riders should always be accompanied by a responsible and capable adult who should make themselves known to the marshal in charge.



Ieannie's Black e'e


